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1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 Overview


Ramboll and Statkraft UK Ltd have prepared this Pre-Application Consultation (PAC) Report for Artfield Forest Wind Farm Limited ('the Applicant'). The PAC report will accompany a planning application ('the Application') under S36 of the Electricity Act 1989 for the proposed Artfield Forest Wind Farm ('the Proposed Development'). The report details, the consultation measures undertaken by the Applicant, the feedback received and any resultant modifications to the development.

The Applicant recognises that it is very important to ensure that communities close to a development are afforded appropriate and meaningful opportunities to comment on the proposals before they are finalised in accordance with good practice guidance. A timeline of all consultation undertaken is provided in Appendix 1.

1.2 The Proposed Development

The Proposed Development is located approximately 8 km northwest of Kirkcowan and 15 km west of Newton Stewart in the Dumfries and Galloway Council area and is centred on National Grid Reference (NGR) NX 24367 66928 as shown in Map 1 below.

Map 1: Site Location



The Proposed Development will comprise of up to 12 wind turbines with a maximum tip height of 180 metres (m) and an installed capacity of over 50 MWs.

The main components of the development proposal include:

- Up to 12 three-bladed horizontal axis wind turbines with a maximum tip height of 180 m
- Internal/ external transformers and related switchgear at each turbine;
- Permanent turbine foundations and associated crane hardstanding at each turbine location;
- A permanent anemometer mast or LiDAR compound including associated foundations and hardstanding;
- A network of on-site access tracks with associated water crossings, intervisible passing place and turning heads using both new and upgraded existing tracks;
- Search areas for up to four borrow pits;
- A control building and substation compound (selection one of two options);
- An energy storage facility (selection one of two options);
- A network of underground cable arrays within the Site connecting the turbines to the on-site substation;
- Two temporary construction compounds and laydown area, including concrete batching plant;
- Search areas of up to four borrow pits
- A main site entrance on C3w (existing Gass Farm entrance), for use during construction and operation, designed to accommodate abnormal indivisible loads required for turbine component;
- A secondary site access for use during construction only;
- Engineering operations which includes for example turbine foundations, access tracks, and peat excavation and restoration work; and
- Forestry felling and restocking and associated ancillary work.

Further information is provided in EIAR Volume 2: Chapter 2: Development Description.

1.3 The Applicant

The Proposed Development is being proposed by Artfield Forest Wind Farm Ltd, a wholly owned subsidiary of Statkraft UK Ltd. Statkraft is a global company in energy market operations. Statkraft are Europe's largest generator of renewable energy, with 4,500 employees across 17 countries and its Scottish headquarters are in Glasgow.

In Scotland, Statkraft owns and operates three onshore wind farms and have two wind farms under construction in Dumfries and Galloway (February 2021). The Applicant is committed to setting up a Community Benefit Fund in each of their project locations and over £500,000 is distributed annually to projects and initiatives located near their operating wind farms across the UK. Example initiatives include education, energy efficiency, facilities for community halls, and playground equipment.

This Proposed Development, if consented, will contribute £5,000 per MW installed capacity to a Community Fund. Based on an installed capacity of up to 67.2 MW capacity (12 x 5.6 MW candidate turbine), this could result in an annual value of £336,000 per annum. With a 30 year operational consent, this could provide over £10.08 million in community benefit. More detail on the socioeconomic benefits of the project can be found in Volume 2: Chapter 13: Socioeconomics Section 13.4 (paragraphs 13.4.20 to 13.4.22).

Statkraft recognises the importance of the economic benefits to Scotland and the rest of the UK from investing in onshore wind generation. It is expected that the Proposed Development would further economic opportunities within the region and would contribute significant income to support local services through business rates.

It is estimated that, during the construction phase, the Proposed Development will be worth approximately £50.4 million to £72 million to the UK economy. Of that approximately £27.6 million is expected to be spent within Scotland (national) and approximately £8.7 million¹ is expected to be spent within Dumfries and Galloway (regional). It is anticipated that up to 13% of planning and development costs for the Proposed Development could be spent in Dumfries and Galloway, and 36% of the value in Scotland. (Renewable UK (2015), Onshore Wind: Economic Impacts 2014).

Over the last 10 years, Statkraft has invested over £200 million in renewable energy infrastructure in Scotland. Statkraft is fully committed to the Scottish and UK renewable energy sector and a net-zero economy.

1.4 Public Consultation Guidance and Legislation

Permission for the Proposed Development is being sought under a Section 36 application which does not carry a statutory requirement for Pre-Application Consultation (PAC). However, the Applicant recognises the benefits of carrying out early consultation during the planning process and considers producing a PAC report as best practice.

The Scottish Government's Planning Advice Note (PAN) 3/2010 – Community Engagement Planning with People, while not applicable to this development type, has been used as a framework and guide for carrying out the PAC engagement activity for the Proposed Development.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic the Scottish Government provided development planning and engagement regulations through 'The Town and Country Planning (Emergency Period and Extended Period) Regulations', which is currently in force until 31 March 2021. The document provides advice on consultation and engagement, whilst there is a ban on public gatherings and there is need for physical distancing. It is stated that stakeholders should be engaged digitally and the consultation engagement should involve information in user friendly format on a free, publicly accessible website. Also, the engagement should be enhanced in non-digital communication too, which may include placing articles in newspapers circulated locally, expanding contact with community councils, or letters to households in areas where there are significant proposals for change. It should be made clear if there are mechanisms for people to obtain copies of the engagement materials offline, as well as the ability for them to submit comments by post. These regulations have been adhered to during the PAC.

For the Proposed Development engagement activities have concentrated on community councils within approximately 10 km area of the site located within Dumfries and Galloway as the host local authority to the Proposed Development. To the north of the Proposed Development beyond the operational Kilgallioch wind farm lies South Ayrshire Council and the Community Council area of Barrhill. Regardless of the Council Administration area, all properties and business within this area of the Proposed Development were mailed to seek residents' views on the Proposed Development (See Appendix 2).

During the pre-application stage of this Proposed Development the aim has been to enable the local community and those with an interest in the proposal a clear opportunity to provide comment and feedback prior to submitting a planning application. The report sets out the background and details of the pre-application public exhibition process carried out by the Applicant in the preparation of the Section 36 application and how the feedback received has resulted in any modifications to the development.

2. CONSULTATION MEASURES

2.1 Consultation Measures Review

The Scottish Government's Planning Advice Note (PAN) 3/2010 – Community Engagement Planning with People which provides guidelines for Pre-Application Consultation have been used as a framework for the engagement activity for this Proposed Development.

PAN 3/2010 stipulates that community engagement should be meaningful and proportionate and take place at an early stage to influence the shape of proposals. PAN 3/2010 uses National Standards for Community Engagement, developed by Communities Scotland, as its structure.

It further states, "Effective engagement with the public can lead to better plans, better decisions and more satisfactory outcomes and can help to avoid delays in the planning process. It also improves confidence in the fairness of the planning system."

This provided a useful framework to help plan, monitor and evaluate community engagement in relation to this development.

2.2 Pre-Application Meetings

In advance of the Scoping Request and contacting the communities, we contacted Dumfries & Galloway Council and the Energy Consents Unit to check that they were prepared and had capacity for the Scoping Request due to COVID-19. Both confirmed capacity for the Scoping Request to be submitted.

In relation to Dumfries & Galloway Council, the Applicant arranged to meet the Major Developments Team Leader on the 22 January 2020 to introduce the Proposed Development. A further virtual meeting was held on 21 August 2020 to provide an update on the design evolution.

In addition, the Applicant held a pre-application meeting with the Scottish Government Energy Consents Unit on the 24 February 2020.

2.3 Scoping

A Scoping Report (ECU00002042) was submitted to the Energy Consents Unit on 7 May 2020 for the construction and operation of the Proposed Development. A Scoping Opinion was requested under terms of regulation 12 of the Electricity Works (Environmental Impact Assessment) (Scotland) Regulation 2017, as amended ('the EIA regulations').

The Scoping Report went live on the Energy Consents Unit website on the 11 May 2020 with Statutory and Non-Statutory consultees consulted as part of the formal scoping process.

This PAC report outlines the engagement with Community Councils. Summaries of the statutory consultees' responses are provided in EIAR Volume 4: Technical Appendix 1.1: Consultation Register.

2.4 Community Councils

Statkraft wrote to Community Councils on the 19 May 2020 around the same time the Scoping Report was published on the Energy Consents Unit portal. The purpose of the letter was to, directly introduce Statkraft and the proposal to the Community Councils, and offer a virtual meeting or to attend a future virtual community council meeting. A short presentation with maps of the Site and the redline boundary was included with the introduction letter. The letter and presentation can be found in Appendix 3.

- Kirkcowan Community Council (host community council);
- New Luce Community Council (host community council); and
- Old Luce Community Council (neighbouring community council).

All three community councils acknowledged our introduction letter by email and we also followed up with phone calls to introduce the plans.

Old Luce Community Council requested a presentation and we provided a full zoom presentation and answered questions on the Proposed Development on 29 June 2020.

On 3 July 2020, following contact from Cree Valley Community Council (neighbouring community council), we sent the presentation and an introduction letter to Cree Valley Community Council and outlined how to provide a Scoping response to the Scottish Government. We attended a virtual Cree Valley Community Council meeting on 14 July 2020 and provided a full zoom presentation and answered questions on the plans. It is possible the access route and the cable route for the Proposed Development will fall within the Cree Valley Community Council area.

We recorded a full presentation of the plans and emailed a link to Kirkcowan Community Council and New Luce Community Council to ensure all community councils had similar information at the start of the process. New Luce provided a response to the Scoping Report on 10 September 2020 please see Appendix 3a for response.

At the start of the virtual consultation, New Luce Community Council highlighted that they had not received a Scoping Request from the Scottish Government (due to an incorrect email address) although they had received Statkraft's email updates from May 2020 onwards. It was confirmed that their Scoping response will be taken into account by the Energy Consents Unit and Statkraft received a copy of the Scoping response, which has provided helpful feedback in relation to the proposals.

2.5 Elected Representatives

Local Ward Councillors for Mid-Galloway and Wigtown West were written to at the time of the Scoping Report (May 2020) to inform them of the plans. We also provided a short presentation with the introduction letter with maps of the Site and the redline boundary and offered a virtual meeting to introduce the plans – Appendix 4.

We wrote to the Mid-Galloway and Wigtown West ward members and the local MSP at the start of the virtual consultation to highlight the exhibition and to invite them to take part.

2.6 Website

Our approach has been to provide information and consult with local residents and community representatives at an early stage of the process and provide a line of communication throughout the consultation process.

The project website (www.artfield-forest.co.uk) was set up earlier than usual in the project development, at the same time as the Scoping Request was submitted, due to the project team being unable to meet local residents and community representatives in person. The website provided easy access to all the Proposed Development information and provided a way for the Project Team to be contacted while it was not possible for them to be present in the community due to COVID-19 (See Appendix 13).

The project website included short video introductions of some of the team members, an FAQ section, project maps, a timeline of the project and contact details. A 10 minute presentation of the project was uploaded too, providing members of the public and community groups with an interactive presentation of the initial plans.

Results of Website activity from 22 May (when the website was first published) to 31 December 2020 include:

- Over 900 visits were recorded to the website
- Approximately 500 people visited the site with nearly 50% viewing multiple pages
- 142 documents downloads
- 69 views of the video by the Project Manager Tom Walker, introducing the project.
- 126 views of the FAQs

2.7 Virtual Public Exhibition

A Virtual Public Exhibition was held for the Proposed Development between 24 August and 18 September 2020.

Further information about the Exhibition is presented in the Section 3 of the report.

3. VIRTUAL PUBLIC EXHIBITION

3.1 Background

In line with the guidance issued under the regulations in relation to COVID-19 pandemic the Public Exhibition was held online via a dedicated consultation website set up for this purpose.

The online public consultation was held from 24 August to 18 September 2020 at www.artfield-forest.co.uk. The event was publicised in various ways to ensure as many local residents knew about the development so should they choose, they could engage in the planning process.

3.2 Community Council Invite and Notification Letter to Virtual Public Exhibition

A letter was issued to host and neighbouring Community Councils at the start of the consultation to highlight the consultation and inviting them to take part. (See Appendix 5).

Community Councils also publicised the consultation via their Facebook and webpages, helping to inform local residents about the Proposed Development. (See Appendix 6)

3.3 Ward Member and Elected Representative Invite and Notification Letter to Virtual Public Exhibition

A letter was issued to Ward Councillors at the start of the consultation to highlight the consultation and inviting them to take part. (See Appendix 7 and Appendix 8).

3.4 Newspapers Adverts and Social Media Adverts

The public notice (see Appendix 9) was published in the Dumfries & Galloway Standard newspaper on Friday 21 August 2020 and Tuesday 25 August 2020. This notice also provided an email address and contact details so that readers could contact Statkraft if they had any comments relating to the Proposed Development.

The Stranraer & Wigtonshire Free Press ceased to produce a hard copy during the COVID-19 lockdown. Therefore an online advert was placed on Stranraer & Wigtownshire Free Press social media. The advert was a 'pinned' on their Facebook page for a week from Monday 24 August 2020. The Advert had several 'likes' and 'shares'. (See Appendix 9).

A number of 'Tweets' were also posted on the Statkraft UK Twitter account to promote the exhibition and particular times that members of the Project Team were available to discuss the project or answer any questions for those attending the exhibition (See Appendix 10).

3.5 Online Exhibition Invitation to Households and Businesses

In advance of the Exhibition, invitations (see Appendix 11) were distributed to over 900 homes within approximately 10 km of the Site which included the villages of Glenluce, New Luce and Kirkcowan and Glenluce (see Appendix 2 for invitation distribution area). The invitation provided details of how to take part in the online consultation.

3.6 Online and Offline Feedback Forms

The invitation to the online exhibition provided residents of the 900 homes the opportunity to provide feedback on the project (see Appendix 11). The 'hard copy' of the feedback card was accompanied by a freepost envelope. For respondents who preferred to provide their thoughts via the consultation website, details of the online form were provided

3.7 Verbal Communication

A project hotline continues to be available to residents to speak to a member of the Project Team. During the exhibition period the option to request a call back was also provided.

When hosting online meetings to discuss the project, an option to dial in via a mobile or landline has always been provided to attendees.

3.8 Digital First Approach

A separate website was set up to host the Virtual Exhibition, which could be accessed any time over a 4 week period, via a link from the Proposed Development project website. The virtual exhibition sought to replicate the type of information and materials available at a physical exhibition, see Appendix 12 for Brochure that was available online. This included:

- Exhibition boards - information you would usually find at a village hall exhibition online. This covered (1) Information on the developer (2) An overview of the Proposed Development, including layout, transport route (3) Several key viewpoints - visualisations based on the EIA Scoping layout (4) An overview of the Environmental Impact Assessment process (5) Community Benefit, Construction opportunities and Community Ownership Information;
- Pre-recorded videos introducing the project and some of the project team as well videos on key aspects of the project;
- Extensive FAQ section on the project to help inform residents when they arrive on the consultation website (see Appendix 13 for example screen shots from the website);
- Multiple key view points with 'sliders' to see current landscape and then a photomontage of how the landscape would look with the proposed project to allow residents to compare and contrast the current landscape with that of the proposed project;
- Live Q&A sessions - giving residents the opportunity to have live interactive chat with the project team – these took place on 3 September 2020, 11am – 1pm and 5pm – 7pm and on 18 September 2020, 11am – 1pm. This ensured time slots in the afternoon and evening to provide members of the public with the best opportunity at which to attend;
- Request an appointment; A 'ring back' service to allow members of the public to have a dedicated chat with our team at a date/ time suitable to them; and
- An opportunity to leave comments through online feedback forms.

The aim of the public exhibitions was to provide an opportunity for the community to view the Proposed Development and gain valuable feedback on the project.

4. ENGAGEMENT AFTER VIRTUAL PUBLIC EXHIBITION AND CONSULTATION PERIOD

4.1 Letters/ Emails to Feedback Card Respondents

All individuals who left comments and asked questions via the feedback forms (online or offline) have been responded to directly (where GDPR has allowed - for individuals who ticked the box not to be contacted in their feedback form, we have included general responses on our website). Please see Appendix 14 for examples of responses to these communications.

4.2 Community Councils


Regular contact was kept with Community Councils to provide updates on the project generally and to progress topics identified through feedback forms to be of particular interest to the local communities i.e. Shared Ownership and Broadband.

4.3 Feedback Report

We received over 223 webpage views on the separate and dedicated website set up to host the virtual public exhibition website from 24 August to 16 November, with several call backs and online forms completed. We have also received 64 feedback forms and 6 online forms completed, with over half outlining general support for the proposals.


The online and postal feedback form contained several questions:

Figure 1: Do you think this is an acceptable location for a wind farm?




Based on 70 responses.

Topics and questions raised through the consultation have been addressed in the EIA Report for the Proposed Development.

A copy of the Feedback Report was sent to local Community Councils and elected representatives in December 2020. Examples of the communications sent and a copy of the full report can be found at Appendix 15.

5. RESPONSE TO CONSULTATION COMMENTS

5.1 Key Issues Raised during the Consultation

The public consultation and engagement programme for the project has adapted to cope with the restrictions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Members of the local community have been provided with several opportunities to engage with the project and several ways to provide feedback.

A summary of comments can be found in the table below - supportive comments focused on the project being a good location, good for the local communities and in favour of harnessing renewable energy. Negative comments focused on the cumulative impact of the proposed turbines and potential habitat/ wildlife impact.

General comments raised on feedback forms during the virtual exhibitions and online meetings/ calls pre- and post-exhibition along with Statkraft's response to these are contained below.

'Get on with it'

'Onshore wind farms are the future'

'There are already 6 wind farms in the area blighting the landscape and no more is needed'

'Will there be employment for local people?'

'I would be interested how you propose to protect bird life?'

'Would you consider local electricity discount scheme'

5.2 Responding to Issues Raised

6. CONCLUSIONS

6.1 Key Outcomes

Feedback from consultations at the scoping stage and virtual exhibition meetings have helped inform the iterative design process of the Proposed Development, as outlined in EIAR Volume 2: Chapter 3:

6.2 Design Evolution and Alternatives.

The key issues raised and the way they have been addressed are summarised below:

Cumulative

The Proposed Development has reduced in size from 20 turbines at scoping to 12 at the point of exhibition and submission. The turbines have been moved to the north of the Site, reducing the visual and noise impacts on residential properties. The turbine array positioning consolidates the emerging pattern of development by locating turbines to the north and west within the Site, 'infilling' between the surrounding cumulative development and increasing the separation from key landscape, residential properties and transport corridors.

Environmental

A number of environmental studies that have informed the design of the Site have addressed the environmental queries raised during the consultation phase.

The completion of the constraints mapping, which was informed by environmental studies have resulted in a reduction of proposed turbines from 20 to 12.

Community Benefits

While recognising that Community Benefits are not considered material in the planning decision for this development a number of suggestions and queries were raised during the consultation phase. The ideas submitted about how Community Benefit Funds could be used within the community are being gathered and will be shared with Community Councils for future consideration. Residents indicated interest in finding out more about shared ownership and broadband opportunities. An initial meeting has been held regarding shared ownership with Local Energy Scotland (December 2020) (see Appendix 16).

Concerns and questions raised by members of the public at the Public Exhibitions and throughout the development process have been addressed through the assessments presented in the EIA.

The pre-application consultation carried out for the Proposed Development was open, transparent and in line with the Scottish Government's guidelines under Development Procedures and PAN 3/2010 and following relevant COVID-19 legislation.

The design of the Proposed Development has evolved during the project, including in response to the PAC process. The engagement with the local community has been proportionate and a constructive consultation process has helped us to understand and address concerns.

We would like to put on record our thanks to the community councils and local residents for their input and time in the planning process to date and look forward to continuing to work with them going forward.

6.3 Community Engagement Following S36 Application Submission

Statkraft, on behalf of Artfield Forest Wind Farm Limited, is committed to continuing engagement with the surrounding communities and residents throughout the S36 process and will continue to respond to any feedback or queries received from the community.

We aim to continue our discussions on shared ownership and broadband with the surrounding community councils in 2021.

The Developer will continue to follow all Scottish Government advice in relation to COVID-19 and will offer conference calls, video calls to the community councils and interested residents and groups once the application is submitted.

The S36 application documents will also be published on the project website www.artfield-forest.co.uk. The website will also continue to be updated with progress i.e. such as any planned events.

APPENDIX 3A: NEW LUCE COMMUNITY COUNCIL SCOPING REPORT RESPONSE – 10 SEPTEMBER 2020

Response by New Luce Community Council to a Scoping Opinion Request for the Proposed Section 36 Application for A Proposed Wind Farm consisting of up to 20 Wind Turbines (Each up to 180m Base to Tip) and Associated Infrastructural Development at Artfield Forest, 7km to the East of New Luce. ECU ref: ECU00002042

While we note that an earlier windfarm proposal on part of the Proposed Site had been consented, the information on number and location of turbines as fully envisaged in the new Application has not been made available to the public, or ourselves. It is therefore difficult to respond to a Proposal whose presentation to the public has not been honest.

We note with approval that virtually all of the Proposed Development is located within an afforested area, though we would advise that Lidar surveys can now detect archaeological sites even within areas affected by afforestation, so we would encourage the Developer to use this technology to refine plans for developing the site. The area immediately to the North of the site, that covered by the Kilgallioch Extension Windfarm Proposal (SPR), is known to be archaeologically rich, so it would follow that there is more archaeology in the Proposed Site than is currently recognized. It is nevertheless concerning that the northernmost turbines are sited so close to this archaeological area, particularly the Monandie sites.

Our other main concern with the Proposal as fully envisaged is the question of leaving gaps between the Proposal and other neighbouring windfarms. One of the two of our main objections to the Kilgallioch Extension Proposal was that it closed the gap between the Artfield/Artfield Extension windfarms and the SE extent of the Kilgallioch Windfarm, helping to further perceptions of a North/South 'wall' of turbines along the eastern boundary of our community area, which we find to be very alien to the character of our landscape. The SNH Guidelines particularly urges developers not to close gaps, and the current Scottish Government Energy Policy (2017) focus on extensions and repowering can in no way be construed as encouraging developers to ignore SNH advice. SPR built a case that their Proposed Layout did not close this gap, but to ourselves it is common sense that the layout did do precisely this. We did not agree with their findings. Obviously, the other gap between Artfield Fell Windfarm and Glenchamber Windfarm is a matter of concern to ourselves, and in our view the southernmost turbines (nos. 18, 19 and 20) as envisaged do not leave much of a gap in this area, when seen from the W and SW, the main approach direction on this side. The size of the turbines in question (180m) add to this question. The two gaps can be very clearly appreciated from the highest point of the road between New Luce Village and Castle Kennedy, and we regard this as one of the key reference points in the area.

We would therefore urge the Developer to give full consideration to maintaining the gaps as discussed, and to archaeological sensitivities, particularly at the northern end of the Proposed Site.




Part of our site has previously been developed and approved for a wind farm, but this has since expired. All studies have been started again and re-assessed for this new wind farm application.

The eastern section of the Site was previously the subject of a planning consent for Gass Wind Farm, consisting of nine 126.5m turbines. 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Landscape and Visual Assessments

What will the project look like?

As part of our studies, we have created images showing how the wind turbines could look from a variety of locations. These will be available to view within the planning documents when it is submitted.

The locations of the viewpoints will be agreed with Scottish Natural Heritage and Dumfries & Galloway Council. They will form part of a full landscape and visual assessment of our proposal.

The design has considered how the turbine locations, size and scale would relate to key landscape characteristics and visual amenity in the surrounding area.

As developers, our challenge is to find the right balance between maximising the electricity output of a site and carefully siting and designing the proposal to relate to the existing landscape, including other wind developments.

This proposal has been designed as an infill to nearby operating wind farms including the operational Glenchamber Wind Farm, Airies Wind Farm, Kilgallioch Wind Farm, Artfield Fell and Balmurrie Fell Wind Farm and the proposed Kilgallioch Wind Farm Extension.



Environmental Impact Assessment

The process of gathering good environmental data on a site is vital to designing a good wind farm, including turbine locations, access roads and other infrastructure. This is carried out by specialist environmental and technical consultants.

This information is incorporated into an Environmental Impact Assessment Report (EIAR), which will be publicly available.

As part of designing this wind farm, advice and guidance has been sought from a range of regulatory and voluntary bodies including, but not limited to, Dumfries and Galloway Council, Scottish Natural Heritage, Scottish Environment Protection Agency, Transport Scotland and Historic Environment Scotland.



The results and findings will be detailed in the EIAR which is made public when we submit our planning application.

Cultural Heritage



Wood Cairn is the closest Scheduled Monument to the site boundary and overlooks the proposed development to its southwest. It is possible that the proposed development would have an impact on the setting of this Scheduled Monument. In order to reduce and avoid negative impacts where possible, site visits have been undertaken and consultation with Historic Environment Scotland is ongoing. This has led to the proposed turbines moving further west to reduce the impact on Wood Cairn when viewed from the north.

The design of the proposed development has taken account of all cultural heritage assets within the site boundary, seeking to avoid direct impact on these assets. The remains of historic farmsteads and field systems within the Site will also be avoided and retained in situ.

22

Ecology



The proposed development is located within the River Bladnoch catchment. Tarf Water, a tributary of River Bladnoch Special Area of Conservation (SAC), flows through the Site. The River Bladnoch SAC is designated for its Atlantic salmon.

The Site is dominated by coniferous plantation woodland. Smaller areas of other habitats found on the site include acid grassland; blanket bog and marshy grassland.

Surveys identified the presence of four different bat species on the site, and we have a detailed understanding of bat activity and how to design the wind farm accordingly, such as using buffer zones around the forest edges.

The potential for effects on birds, sensitive habitats and on protected species, including bats and water voles, has been rigorously assessed. Biodiversity was a key consideration at the project design stage, and subsequently significant adverse impacts on wildlife and important habitats will be avoided through careful planning.

23

Forestry



Trees and turbines both play an important role in the fight against climate change, and trees located on wind farm sites are carefully managed and monitored via planning conditions throughout the operating period.

In Scotland, a Government requirement to replant any felled trees came into force in 2009.

The site includes 679 ha of plantation forest and associated open ground. The woodland area is comprised of three separately managed units. Two of these forests have entered the forest restructuring phase with felling and replanting taking place.

At least 25 ha of woodland would need to be cleared and remain unplanted to accommodate the proposed development.

Forestry is carefully considered as part of the wind farm development process and detailed information on forest redesign and proposals for replanting will be publicly available in planning application documents.

Transport



Our assessments include showing impacts on local roads during construction and operations, using existing road use as a base level.

Due to Covid-19, traffic flows will have been significantly affected and are not considered to provide an accurate representation. Traffic flow data from the previously consented Gass wind farm and other nearby planning applications, together with A75 traffic flow data obtained from the Department for Transport, will be used in the assessment of construction traffic impacts.

A detailed plan showing how the longest and largest turbine components will be transported to the site will be included in the EIAR to demonstrate that the turbine components can be delivered to site and to identify any temporary road works which may be necessary.

I am writing to provide a short update on Statkraft's Artfield Forest Wind Farm proposals.

We held a consultation on the project in August/ September 2020 and, since then, have responded to the individual queries on the project and we are grateful for the time and feedback from local residents and community representatives. We have now produced a short 'Consultation Report' to provide a summary of the online exhibition and the feedback we received (in line with GDPR) we will upload it to our project website and share it with the local community councils. Please find a copy attached. With moving the consultation online, in line with Scottish Government guidance due to Covid-19, we thought it would also be useful to provide a summary of the consultation.

As part of the online consultation, we provided live Q&A sessions, a 'ring back' service to allow members of the public to have a dedicated chat with our team at a date/time suitable to them and the opportunity to leave comments through an online feedback form. We also wrote to over 900 households and businesses within 10km of the proposals to highlight the consultation and provided feedback cards for those unable or would prefer to write back then to go online.

One of the key areas of feedback from the online exhibition was shared ownership, with a majority of respondents either interested or unsure about the opportunity of community/shared ownership of the project. We ourselves are fairly new to community/shared ownership offering and we are following the Scottish Government's Best Practice Principles for Shared Ownership. We organised a shared ownership virtual meeting on 16th December with several of the local community councils and Local Energy Scotland - it was a welcome start to the discussion on shared ownership and we have agreed to share a Memorandum of Understanding for the project in the new year.

If you would like to discuss the consultation report or any aspect of the project then we would welcome the chance to do so - we appreciate the Christmas Holidays are coming up but would be happy to do so in 2021 and/or do come back with any queries by email.

ABOUT ARTFIELD FOREST WIND FARM

Artfield Forest Wind Farm is a proposal for a 12 wind turbine project, located approximately 8km northeast of Glenluce, within the administration boundary of Dumfries and Galloway Council.

A programme of community engagement and consultation for the proposal commenced in May 2020. The engagement and consultation was held primarily online, adhering to Scottish Government advice in relation to Covid-19.

INITIAL CONSULTATION PERIOD

It was important to provide communities with several opportunities to engage with the project and the project team during Covid-19 restrictions. To achieve this, a dedicated project website was made available to the public earlier than usual, launched when the scoping request was first submitted.

The host and neighbouring community councils within Dumfries and Galloway were directly contacted and offered an opportunity to virtually meet the development team, to find out more about the proposal and have seek their feedback on the consultation approach before the wider community were contacted.

THE CONSULTATION PERIOD

This report presents the findings of the feedback received during the consultation period 24/08/2020 and 16/11/2020 via the virtual public exhibition and non-digital sources such as postal feedback forms. Responses submitted after this date will continue to be evaluated and responded to, if required. The timing of the consultation period activity fell in line with the traditional development steps of a project, engaging and consulting with surrounding communities ahead of submitting a formal planning application.

It is intended to submit a Section 36 application for the proposed Artfield Forest Wind Farm to the Scottish Government in early 2021.

ADVERTISING THE PUBLIC CONSULTATION

Consultation on the proposed Artfield Forest Wind Farm was held from 24 August to 16 November 2020. A dedicated consultation website was set up, which could be accessed via a link from the Artfield Forest project website.

The event was publicised in various ways, including:

- **Local press:** Advertised in the Dumfries & Galloway Standard over a two week period (appendix 1);
- **Local social media:** Online advert on Stranraer & Wigtonshire Free Press social media for a week (hardcopy of the paper not printed during Covid) (appendix 1);
- **Community mail out/direct mail:** Mailing to over 900 homes within 10km of the site with details of how to take part in the consultation (appendix 2 and 3). Feedback cards and freepost envelopes, for residents who would prefer to write back, rather than go online, were included in the mailing (appendix 4);
- **Engaging local representatives:** Writing to local elected representatives, including the host and neighbouring Community Councils and local ward members within Dumfries and Galloway – in line with Community Councils listed by the Energy Consents Unit (see appendix 2);
- **Community Council social media:** Community Councils kindly helped to publicise via their Facebook pages; and
- **Dedicated project website:** news of the consultation was available on the Artfield Forest project website throughout the consultation period, and all those subscribed to receive news updates were notified.

The information contained in the online consultation included:

- **Exhibition boards:** This is the project information usually presented at village hall exhibitions;
- **Pre-recorded videos:** To introduce the project team and addressing key aspects of the project;
- **Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ's):** To help address the key questions visitors may have when visiting the consultation website for the first time. This section was frequently updated to include responses to new queries raised by attendees;
- **Predicted Viewpoints:** A 'slider tool' allowed visitors to easily compare and contrast the current landscape with a photomontage of the predicted view from a number of selected viewpoints;
- **Live Q&A sessions:** Several opportunities provided to join a live, online chat with the project team throughout the online exhibition;
- **Request an appointment:** A 'call-back' function on the website provided the opportunity to request a one-to-one conversation with the Project Manager; and
- **Online feedback forms:** To leave feedback and comments or to ask the Project Team questions.

The project information displayed will continue to be available on the project website, which is continually being updated with the latest project information.

SUMMARY OF CONSULTATION RESPONSES


This section of the report provides an overview of the feedback received during the consultation period for Artfield Forest Wind Farm (24 August to 16 November).

Over 223 visits were recorded to the dedicated project website.

64 feedback forms were returned from the community mailing, providing an important source of information for the project team to understand the communities position on the proposal. A summary of the quantitative and qualitative feedback received from the feedback forms is provided below.


The online and postal feedback form contained several questions:

Figure 1: Do you think this is an acceptable location for a wind farm?




Based on 70 responses.

Shared ownership is a relatively new proposal for communities and some of the uncertainty around this may be because not enough is known about what shared ownership may entail for communities. To answer some of the questions respondents may have regarding this opportunity a virtual roundtable event is being arranged with Local Energy Scotland to discuss shared ownership in more detail with community representatives.

KEY TOPICS RAISED FROM THE CONSULTATION

Overall feedback received from residents showed majority support for our proposal. However, some residents do not support the project, and we thought it would be useful to outline the main topics raised, along with a summary of our responses. All comments made have been taken into account as we finalise our application.

All those who submitted a question or comment received a response, within the limits of data protection principles.

WILL THERE BE A LOCAL ENERGY DISCOUNT SCHEME?

Interest for a local energy discount scheme, similar to those provided by other wind farm schemes in the area, was raised by several respondents.

If the project is consented, a Community Benefit Fund of £5,000 per MW installed will be established. Based on the current proposal, this would deliver a fund of £336,000 per annum for the lifetime of the project. Statkraft aim to have maximum flexibility regarding how community funds are used, as it is recognised communities best understand how funds could be utilised to meet local needs and ambitions.

The ideas in relation to an electricity discount scheme will be passed across to community councils and if an electricity discount scheme, or similar, is preferred by communities this can then be considered in detail.

THERE ARE ALREADY ENOUGH/TOO MANY WIND FARMS IN THE AREA

While the majority of feedback showed residents felt that this was a good location for a wind farm, several respondents raised concerns about the potential cumulative impact of the project in the area. Less than 10% of the land area in Scotland is suitable for large onshore wind farms. This presents a great opportunity for Dumfries & Galloway to be at the forefront of Scotland's net zero ambitions.

As developers it is good to hear and understand what local people think of wind farm developments in the area. The challenge for developers and for the Artfield Forest project has been to find the right balance between maximising the electricity output of a site and blending in with the existing landscape.

The cumulative impact of the project will be assessed in detail as part of the planning application, and all of these assessments will be made available in the planning application (and on our website).

WILL THERE BE ANY OPPORTUNITIES FOR LOCAL BUSINESSES?

Statkraft are committed to working with the local supply chain and is already working with several Dumfries & Galloway companies on the construction of our Windy Rig and Twentysilling Hill projects.

As an existing member of Dumfries and Galloway Chamber of Commerce, work will continue with them and other business groups in the area to ensure local suppliers are aware of the opportunities from our projects. Local businesses have been invited to register their details on our [Local Supplier Database](#).

Should the project gain consent, "Meet the Developer" events for businesses will be organised

WHAT WILL THE IMPACT BE ON WILDLIFE?

Independent experts have carried out and rigorously assessed detailed onsite wildlife surveys and the potential effects on birds, sensitive habitats and on protected species, including bats and water voles.

Biodiversity was a key consideration at the project design stage, and subsequently significant adverse impacts on wildlife and important habitats will be avoided through careful planning.

All the reports which can be made publicly available in relation to wildlife will be included with the planning application documents. Some information relating to sensitive species is confidential and can only be shared with particular statutory consultees.

WILL YOU BE FELLING ANY TREES AND IF SO, WILL YOU BE REPLACING THEM?

The proposed wind farm is situated within an extensive area of commercial forestry whereby felling and replanting is common. If the project is consented, some tree felling will be required to facilitate the wind farm infrastructure, but we will seek to minimise felling. In Scotland, there is a legal requirement to replant any felled areas which are to be kept clear for the duration of the wind farm. The legal requirement will be fulfilled for this project, and detailed information on the proposed replanting will be publicly available in the planning application documents.

INTERESTED IN FINDING OUT MORE ABOUT BROADBAND

Bringing improved broad band to the area is of interest to the majority of respondents. High quality broadband is required to operate wind farms, including Artfield Forest Wind Farm, should it be consented.

Statkraft are the only developer to commit to funding a broadband feasibility study for each of its onshore wind farm development projects. This will assess the potential for fibre and wireless line of sight broadband, required for an operational wind farm, to benefit the local and wider community as well. If there is an opportunity for our wind farms to help improve broadband connections for residents/businesses in the area, then we would be happy to explore this with the community.

Statkraft have commissioned a feasibility study which can be used to start discussions with local residents and their elected representatives, where interest is shown by local communities. Feedback received has shown there is significant interest from local respondents to improve broadband in the area and discussions will be followed up.

NEXT STEPS

As the application for our planning submission is finalised, the next steps for local engagement are:

- Continue to receive feedback and respond to queries.
- Liaise and review with our technical team regarding project-specific feedback.
- Progress setting up a shared ownership (virtual) roundtable with Local Energy Scotland to provide more information to those in the community interested in shared ownership opportunities.
- Follow up with community stakeholders regarding the potential for enhanced access to broadband by sharing the findings of the feasibility study.
- Continue to engage with elected representatives, community councils and local residents to keep them updated on progress.
- Respond to correspondence and calls from local residents.
- Recording and storing all comments made regarding suggestions for community benefit funding.
- Continue to update our project website www.artfield-forest.co.uk

10KM LOCAL CONSULTATION ZONE

For Artfield Forest Wind Farm, we have primarily focused our engagement in the communities nearest the proposals, as well as notifying communities further afield.



The site is located in the Mid-Galloway & Wigton West ward and the community councils in the area are large geographical areas. The map outlines our focus area, which has been within a 10km radius of the site. Key things to note include:

- The Artfield Forest site boundary covers two Community Council areas: Kirkcowan and New Luce.
- The majority of the 10km radius area is covered by Kirkcowan Community Council, New Luce Community Council and Old Luce Community Council, with Cree Valley Community Council and Barrhill Community Council also within 10km of the site.
- The Mid-Galloway & Wigton West electoral ward covers the four Dumfries & Galloway Community Council areas illustrated.

I hope that this email finds you well.

I am getting in touch to provide an update on our Artfield Forest Wind Farm plans. We wrote to the Community Council at the end of September after the online consultation closed to provide a summary of the online exhibition.

We have now responded to the individual queries and we will shortly send a summary report of the exhibition and the main themes raised with us during it to the community councils.

There were two key areas of feedback from the online exhibitions - broadband and shared ownership - that we hope to follow up on and (if of interest) would welcome the community councils and corresponding Development Trusts to provide their views/input.

Shared Ownership – suggested virtual roundtable discussion early December 2020.

In relation to shared ownership - a majority of respondees were either interested or unsure about the opportunity of community/shared ownership of the project. We ourselves are fairly new to community/shared ownership offering and we will be following the Scottish Government's Best Practice Principles for Shared Ownership. It is likely we would look to provide a percentage share of the projects revenue that is open to the community to invest and own via a community Trust. The Trust may be able to both invest in the scheme and raise funds through external sources (such as banks or individuals in the community). Following the exhibition feedback, we have contacted Local Energy Scotland (LES), who have agreed to host a virtual meeting to outline shared ownership opportunities and the process in more detail. If this is of interest to the Community Council, please let me know and we can organise an evening later in November/early December for an online call.

In addition to any shared ownership opportunity available we will also be offering the traditional community benefit for Artfield Forest. We are committed to £5,000 per MW of installed capacity for community benefit and, on the basis of the current MW for the 12 turbine scheme, that would mean £336,000 per annum. Again, for community benefit, we are open to how it is administered (either through a local trust or a group such as Foundation Scotland) and we will take the lead from the community.

Broadband - suggested virtual roundtable discussion early December 2020.


There was a high level of interest in how the project can potentially improve broadband in the local area. We would welcome a discussion on broadband and would suggest having a short discussion/presentation on broadband. If acceptable and to avoid too many demands on your and other members of the community council and community members time, this can be the same evening as the discussion on shared ownership.

For broadband - if the project is consented, we will need broadband installed for it to operate. If there is a chance that we can help improve broadband connections for residents/businesses in the area through installing broadband for the wind farm then we would be happy to explore this with the community.

Do let me know if interested in taking part in either area and we would welcome the chance to have an online virtual meeting. We have issued this email to Kirkcowan Community Council, New Luce Community Council, Old Luce Community Council and Cree Valley Community Council.
